



Eligibility: how do I get involved – where do I fit in?

- What type of organisation are you?
- Is your partnership correctly structured?
- What activities are you proposing? Where?
- How long will your project last?

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


Education in the Global Gateway: a 360-degree approach

- Support Africa's priorities, co-created under Agenda 2063.




Joint Declaration 7th African Union (AU) – European Union (EU) Summit









EU grant awarded (M€) per call





n° of projects & % of overarching priorities





What is ICM?

- Launched in the 2014-2020 programme to fund **short-term mobility of students and staff** between Programme and Partner countries
- Manifold **benefits for individuals and institutions:**
 - Key skills & competences, professional development, enhanced employability, teaching methods, etc.
 - Increased capacities, attractiveness & internationalisation; improved quality of higher education

Activities supported (I)

- Short-term higher education mobility for students, academic and administrative staff
- All levels: Bachelor, Master and PhD candidates
- Mobility in any subject or academic discipline
- Also supports traineeships for students and training for staff
- Study periods and traineeships of 2 – 12 months
- Blended mobility (physical mobility of 5 – 30 days + virtual component)


Activities supported (II)

- All partners in an ICM project can **send and host students and staff** as described in their submitted project and provided that a relevant grant has been secured.
- For Africa, **Bachelor/Master student** mobility is only possible from Africa countries to Europe – so African universities **can send but not host these students. They may host doctoral candidates and staff.**

- European partners may use a part of their **intra-European mobility budget (KA131)** to fund their outgoing students mobility under ICM. More about this later.



Steps after selection

- Upon successfully passing the established quality criteria, European universities are allocated an **ICM grant spread in different regional envelopes**
- Project duration: 24 to 36 months
- For every partnership with a secured budget, an **Inter-Institutional Agreement** is needed between the main applicant in Europe and every partner university in third countries before mobilities can start.



- **An Inter-Institutional agreement** links the European University and its partner institution in a non-associated country
- **A beneficiary grant agreement** links the European university and its E+ National Agency
- **A Participant Grant agreement** links the individual with the European university
- **A learning/mobility agreement** links the participant to both universities





Who can apply?

- **Be coherent!**

Avoid contradictions and “cut and paste” style applications

- **Be explicit!**

Take nothing for granted and don't assume that experts have prior knowledge in your area. Avoid abbreviations or explain them.

- **Be clear!**

Read the questions carefully, provide information in the correct order as indicated in the form.

- **Be concrete!**

Use examples, justify your claims, provide evidence.

- **Be realistic!**

The application is the basis of your project to be; it is also the cornerstone of the commitment you will sign.

- **Keep it simple!**

Use short sentences, vary the length if you wish to make it more interesting but keep it simple and focused.

- **Remain focused!**

Concentrate exclusively on what is asked of you.

- **Double-check your proposal!**

Make sure you have followed all instructions and the proposal meets all mandatory requirements.








Geographical scope of Erasmus Mundus

CB VET action – Selection results 2025

Call 2025 Summary

This year, a total of **611 applications** were received, with 568 proposals declared eligible. Compared to the 2024 call, this represents a 104% increase in submitted applications.

Considering the budget available, the Evaluation Committee recommended **73 applications** for funding. The average **success rate** is therefore **13% of eligible applications**.

Chances to receive an EU grant are radically lower than in the past years (2022 - 2024)


Commitment to global partnerships

More than 27 million has been allocated to the 73 new projects, covering 73 countries and selected from a record number of eligible evaluated proposals.

The projects aim to create bridges to advance VET systems globally through knowledge exchange and mutual growth. They show again how the Erasmus+ programme is committed to building global partnerships beyond the EU.

Partnerships will be formed between European VET organisations and their counterparts in the West Balkans, South and East neighbouring countries, Sub-Saharan Africa, Latin America and the Caribbeans.







REASONS FOR THE INELIGIBLE

1. Ineligible because involves partners from **eligible third countries not associated** to the programme **BUT from 2 different regions**. Cross-regional projects are **not** eligible anymore
2. Ineligible because the **minimum number of entities required** has **not** been reached
3. Ineligible because it does **not** include **at least 2 partners from 2 different eligible third countries not associated** to the programme **within the same region**. Always the same country from region 9 (Botswana) is included instead.
4. Ineligible because involves partners from **eligible third countries not associated to the programme BUT from 2 different regions**. Cross-regional projects are **not** eligible anymore



Youth Exchanges

Young participants (with fewer opportunities) **and/or youth workers shall gather for a short period to implement jointly a non-formal learning programme** (workshops, exercises, debates, role-plays, simulations, outdoor activities, etc.) on a topic of their interest aligned with the thematic priorities and objectives of the CBY action. A Quality Youth exchange:

- *Is based on clearly **identified needs of the young participants**; it relies on their active and direct involvement the preparation, implementation and follow up of the activities;*
- *involves diverse groups of participants and **builds on this diversity**;*
- *encourages the participants to reflect on **topics of common interest and values**;*
- *must have in place effective procedures and **arrangements to promote and guarantee the safety, protection and non-discrimination of the participants**, especially in case of underage participants*
- *ensures the recognition by the participating organisations of the **non-formal and informal learning outcomes of the participants***



Compulsory activities for proposals targeting Region 9

Youth Participation Activities

Activities outside formal education and training that encourage, foster and facilitate young people's participation in civic engagement and democratic life. They consist of workshops, meetings, seminars or other events gathering young people and offering them space for information, debate and active participation on issues relevant to their daily lives.

These activities aim to:

- *provide young people with opportunities to engage and learn to participate in civic society;*
- *raise their awareness about common values and fundamental rights and contribute to the achievement of one or more of the 11 EU Youth Goals;*
- *increase young people's resilience to disinformation, misinformation and propaganda;*
- *empower young people to have influence on policies that affect their lives, by bringing them together with decision makers at local, regional, national and international level*



Activities - Tips for your application

- The **mandatory activities** mentioned before shall be **clearly stated and presented in the proposal**
- It shall be clearly stated in the proposal:
 - How many exchanges;
 - How many young participants will be involved in each exchange;
 - Who will be exchanged among the young workers of the organisations involved;
 - From where to where both young participants and youth workers will be exchanged;
 - Type of mobility/exchange (onsite);
 - For how long and for which task/activity both young participants and youth workers will be exchanged.
- **DO NOT FORGET:** the **total number of mobilities** shall be also included in the Form C embedded in the application that will be submitted via the Funding and Tender Portal.

- Read and check the eligibility criteria for the call carefully
- **Partnerships** --- EU organisations to demonstrate real experience in Africa and with its realities, and the need for some partners & their direct target groups were most of the times missed;
- **Partnerships** --- Knowledge of the other partners, full application proposal and budget split; Manageable partnership
- **Consistent and realistic KPIs and mobilities** shall be indicated in **annex Form C** and in **part B** of the **application** form.
- Consistent budget (Part A – Part B – Excel budget table)




What are ‘virtual exchanges’?

Online people-to-people activities that promote intercultural dialogue and soft skills development. They make it possible for every young person to access high-quality international and cross-cultural education without physical mobility.

They take place in **small groups** and are always **moderated by a trained facilitator**.

They should be **easily integrated into youth (non-formal education) projects or higher education courses** – involve participants from either only one or from both sectors.

Participant organizations must arrange **virtual exchanges for people in the 13-30 age range**.



Activities and expected outcomes



Wide variety of activities and topics possible, but all projects are expected to have a **learning dimension** and to report on it

- On-line facilitated discussions (as part of youth projects)
- On-line facilitates discussions (as part of higher education courses)
- Training of youth workers for virtual exchanges
- Training for university professors/staff for virtual exchanges
- Interactive open on-line courses (community interactions among participants)

Rely as much as possible on existing tools and platforms!

*Foresee a method of **recognition** of participation!*

Participants must be based in the countries of the organisations!

Activities must take place in in the countries of the participating organisations!



Listing number of participants

Maximum EU grant is EUR 500 000. Beneficiaries can receive at most EUR 200 per virtual exchange participant (i.e., young participant or facilitator). i.e. a project of 500 000 € would have to reach at least 2 500 participants)

The total number of participants and trained facilitators must be clearly indicated in the application form:

- There is a **dedicated section** of the KPIs for virtual exchanges projects (last section)
- Mention it in Part B when describing your virtual exchanges

Make sure that your budget respects the funding rule, otherwise it will be reduced!

Other 2026 Novelties

- Change in consortium composition rules! **Minimum of 6 countries and partners in the consortium** (see previous slide on consortium composition)
- **Application form** reduced to **40 pages**
- **Simplification of award criteria** guiding points
